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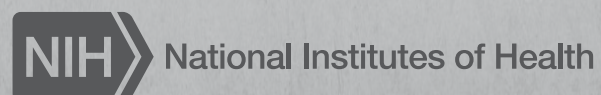

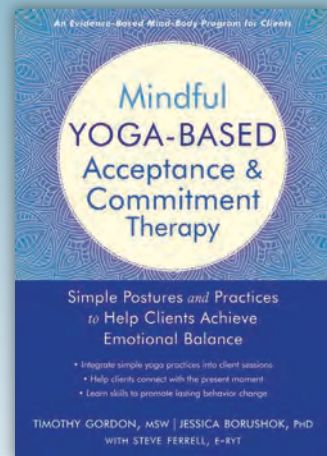

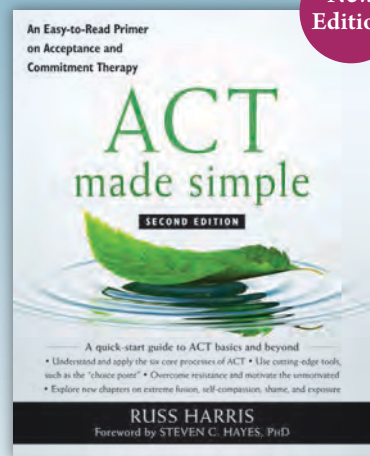
We truly have a lot to be proud of. Enjoy this wonderful Convention!

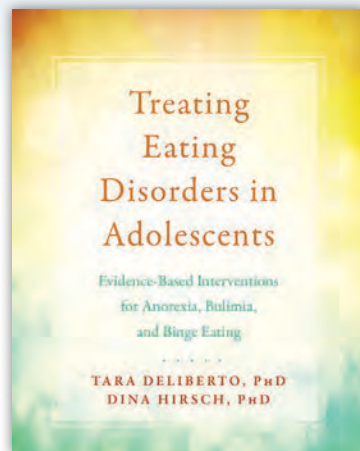

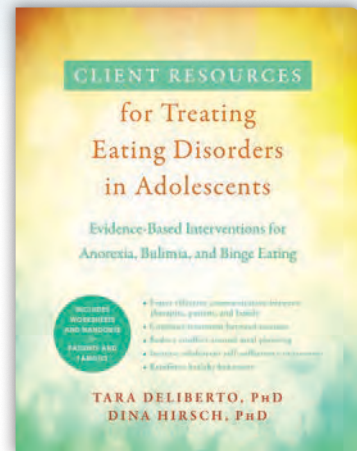

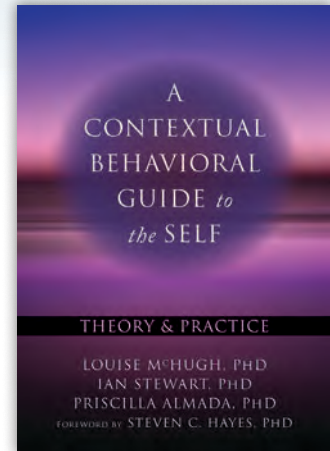

Fred Kavli Keynote Address



Becoming Human: A Theory of Ontogeny

Michael Tomasello

Duke University and the Max Planck Institute for Evolutionary Anthropology, Germany

Over the last two decades, the speaker and his colleagues have documented many differences in the cognitive and social abilities of human children (of different ages) and their nearest great ape relatives. In this talk, the speaker attempts to bring these studies together into a coherent theory of the ontogeny of uniquely human cognition and sociality. For each of eight developmental pathways (social cognition, communication, cultural learning, cooperative thinking, collaboration, prosociality, social norms, moral identity), the presenter attempts to identify the processes of maturation, experience, and self-regulation that transform great ape ontogeny in general into human ontogeny in particular. For each pathway, the maturation of capacities of shared intentionality — in two steps, at 9 months and 3 years of age — make possible new kinds of sociocultural experiences, which, in combination with processes of executive self-regulation, then generate and shape the ontogeny of uniquely human psychology.

How to Change Norms, and Why We Should

Social norms are a topic of global social and political concern—whether they guide behavior in positive or negative directions, who has a say in setting them, and related questions. In every community, social norms are shared ideas about which behaviors are typical or desirable. The presenter describes research conducted in the United States and internationally that tests the power of social norms over individual and collective behavior, including helping and environmentally friendly behavior to bullying and violence. This research helps us to consider why engagement with a community’s social norms is important, when it is not, and who has the power to meaningfully make a change in our ideas of “what is normal.”

Humans have always and uniquely made art, even the mistakenly maligned Neanderthals. The currently oldest stone carvings, found in South Africa, date back 77,000 years. Creating art, like creating artifacts, relies on cycles of perception, action, and imagination, a conversation that typically relies on stuff in the world but is often wordless. The symposium will highlight the inspiring work of two artists, a composer and a painter, and two psychological scientists who have studied the creation of art, in particular, film, dance, and architecture.

Becoming Human: A Theory of Ontogeny



Michael Tomasello

Duke University and Max Planck Institute for Evolutionary Anthropology, Germany

Over the last two decades, the speaker and his colleagues have documented many differences in the cognitive and social abilities of human children (of different ages) and their nearest great ape relatives. In this talk, the speaker attempts to bring these studies together into a coherent theory of the ontogeny of uniquely human cognition and sociality. For each of eight developmental pathways (social cognition, communication, cultural learning, cooperative thinking, collaboration, prosociality, social norms, moral identity), the presenter attempts to identify the processes of maturation, experience, and self-regulation that transform great ape ontogeny in general into human ontogeny in particular. For each pathway, the maturation of capacities of shared intentionality—in two steps, at 9 months and 3 years of age—make possible new kinds of sociocultural experiences, which, in combination with processes of executive self-regulation, then generate and shape the ontogeny of uniquely human psychology.

To learn how cognition is implemented in the brain, we must build computational models that can perform cognitive tasks. Deep neural network models have internal representations remarkably similar to those of the human ventral visual pathway. Adding recurrent signal flow and stochasticity, characteristics of biological neural networks, improves inferential performance and uncertainty representation, and enables models to better explain brain representational dynamics.

Building Machines that Learn and Think like People

Josh Tenenbaum, Massachusetts Institute of Technology

Imagine if we could design AI systems that grow into intelligence the way a person does -- that start like a baby, and learn like a child. I will talk about our research building and testing computational models of how people see, think and learn about the world, starting in early infancy and extending through early childhood into adulthood. Underlying this work are new computational frameworks, known as probabilistic programs and Bayesian program learning, which together with tools from neural networks and video game engines bring us closer to reverse-engineering models of human common sense, and also let us build more human-like forms of intelligence in machines.

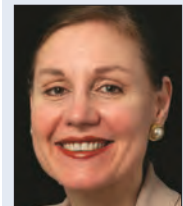

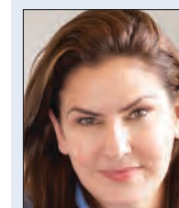

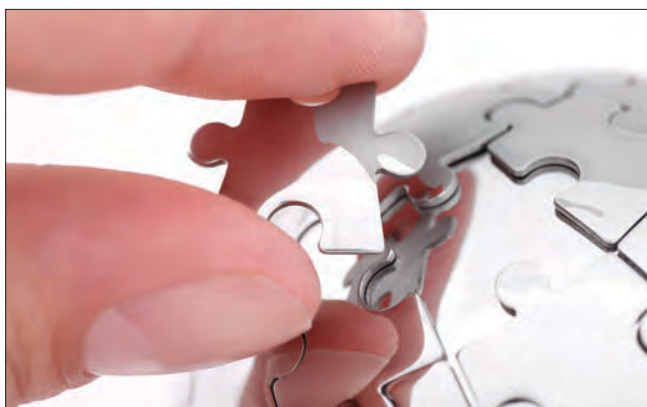

Social norms are a topic of global social and political concern—whether they guide behavior in positive or negative directions, who has a say in setting them, and related questions. In every community, social norms are shared ideas about which behaviors are typical or desirable. The presenter describes research conducted in the United States and internationally that tests the power of social norms over individual and collective behavior, including helping and environmentally friendly behavior to bullying and violence. This research helps us to consider why engagement with a community's social norms is important, when it is not, and who has the power to meaningfully make a change in our ideas of "what is normal."
