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

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

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THEME PROGRAMS

The 26th APS Annual Convention features four cross-cutting theme programs addressing key topics in psychological science. Each program includes a variety of presentations by distinguished speakers.

The Psychology of Violence

Violence is one of the most inexplicable mysteries of modern human behavior. What has psychology learned over the past decades in the etiology of violent behavior, predictors of who will harm others or themselves, and what can evolutionary approaches teach us about our violent ancestral past and the potential for change?

Presidential Cross-Cutting Theme Program Science and Technology

Psychological research and the technology industry mutually inform and influence each other, but rarely do these two worlds meet to engage in open dialogue. This cross-cutting theme program features scientists and industry leaders organized around three subthemes: behavioral genetics, mobile sensing, and social networks. We pose the questions, how can scientists take advantage of rapid technological advances, and how can technology harness what social scientists know about human behavior?

Big Data: Understanding Patterns of Human Behavior

With rapid advances in technology how can psychological science exploit the mountains of information stemming from technology, and what can psychological science teach those developing the technology to optimize the human experience? In this wideranging program speakers will describe how they have harnessed technological advances to understand human behavior, and what the promises and pitfalls may be.

Changing Neurobiology With Behavior

Psychological science often starts with the premise that our neurobiological milieu shapes and influences our behavioral responses. This cross-cutting theme program reverses those causal arrows to explore how behavior—from life experiences to cognitive training to mindfulness attention—can modify underlying biological structure, thus highlighting the bidirectional nature of experiences and biology.



It is with deep sadness that I note the recent passing of Varda Shoham, who was a member of this year's Program Committee as well as an APS Board Member. Varda was a leader in clinical psychological science and a strong advocate for a new accreditation system for the training of clinical scientists. Varda will be greatly missed. Since its founding in 1988, APS has established an unparalleled record of accomplishments in advancing our science. APS journals are widely recognized as among the most important in the field and are on the cutting edge of science, leading the field in efforts to promote research integrity and replicability. On January 1, *Psychological Science* launched a new suite of initiatives aimed at strengthening research practices, improving replicability, and promoting transparency. The changes include removing strict word limits on certain sections of articles; adding a disclosure statement to the submission process, in which authors must confirm they have covered relevant details about exclusions, manipulations, measures and sample size; offering Open Practices badges to encourage authors to publicly share data and materials and to preregister research plans; and encouraging authors to embrace the "new statistics." You can learn more about these changes to *Psychological Science* at a coffee with *PS* Editor Eric Eich here at the convention on Saturday morning.

Last year, *Perspectives on Psychological Science*, launched a new effort – Registered Replication Reports – aimed at supporting the replication of research studies. The first project includes 30 labs from seven countries. The results – whether successful replications or not – will be published in *Perspectives* later this year. A second project is underway, and more proposals are in the pipeline. Thanks to a grant from the Center for Open Science, APS can provide financial support to qualified labs participating in Registered Replication projects. *Perspectives* editor Barbara Spellman will chair a symposium on the "Replication Revolution" on Saturday.

Last year APS announced a major new initiative, the inaugural International Convention of Psychological Science (ICPS), to promote international cooperation and showcase integrative advances in psychological science. ICPS has a unique structure that pairs thematic programs with workshops that teach the cutting-edge research methods that yielded the research results presented. This innovative conference is the first-of-its-kind opportunity for the global psychological science community to examine our most pressing scientific questions, led by the most prestigious researchers in not only psychological science but also neuroscience, genetics, sociology, anthropology, linguistics, economics, and related fields. You can see a list of ICPS speakers and learn more at www.icps-2015.org.

The reach of psychological science just keeps expanding. In the last year, APS has surpassed 30,000 followers on both Facebook and Twitter, and news about research from APS journals has become a popular feature on Reddit – a social news and content sharing site – bringing more than 500,000 visitors to the APS website each month. Wray Herbert's blog "We're Only Human" is a popular staple on Huffington Post. In addition, we've launched a new blog – Minds for Business that is now regularly covered in such prominent outlets as the *Wall Street Journal* and *Inc*. All of this means that thanks to efforts by APS, findings from psychological science are reaching new and expanding audiences.

This is just a snapshot of some of the exciting developments in our field that are directly attributable to the support of APS Members, who number more than 26,000 from 93 countries. I'd also like to take this opportunity to thank the incomparable APS staff. As you participate in this convention over the next several days, you'll be experiencing one of the most impressive collections of programs in the field of psychological science. It's an event only APS could assemble.

CONCEPTUAL AND LITERAL BRIDGES



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



Emotions are the threads that make up the fabric of our lives. They protect us from danger, create and

break bonds with others, help us navigate our way in the social world, and powerfully influence whether we are ultimately happy or unhappy, healthy or sick. In this William James Award address, I will describe some of the enduring mysteries about emotion that have driven my research over the years (some of which trace back to James's writings over a century ago). These include questions about what emotions are and what they do, the sources of emotional differences among individuals and their consequences, how emotions are organized in the nervous system, and how emotions are influenced by normal aging and disease. I will report on progress made toward unraveling some of these mysteries using laboratory methods for eliciting emotions, studies of dyadic interaction, cross-cultural comparisons, longitudinal designs, and work with neurological patients.

Maladaptation and **Resilience in Maltreated Children: A Multiple Levels** of Analysis Perspective

Dante Cicchetti University of Minnesota

Child maltreatment sets in motion a cascading path of epigenesis for abused and neglected children that

results in a profile of relatively enduring vulnerability factors that increase the probability of the emergence of maladaptive biological and psychological development and psychopathology across multiple levels of analysis. However, some abused and neglected children function in a competent fashion despite the pernicious experiences they have encountered. investigations Multilevel have been conducted in Cicchetti's laboratory that incorporate genetic, epigenetic, neurophysiological, endocrinological, and psychological processes aimed at examining pathways to maladaptation, psychopathology, and resilience in maltreated children. These multilevel studies are the focus of this address, and suggestions for future multilevel intervention research are proffered with illustrations from planned and ongoing work in the laboratory.

Measurement in a Complex World: The Case of Noncognitive Assessments in College Admissions

Neal Schmitt Michigan State University

A decade of research aimed

at supplementing the SAT or ACT with assessments of noncognitive measures is described. Schmitt and colleagues assessed the validity and impact of the use of these measures on differential subgroup selection rates, acceptability of the measures to various constituencies, susceptibility to faking and coaching, and potential use as a counseling tool. 





Make It Stick: How Memory Athletes Perform and How Their Techniques Can Help You

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
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
This kind of understanding can enhance students' proficiency in (1) making inferences about existing phenomena, (2) making counterfactual inferences about the factors that can produce, inhibit, or alter existing or potential phenomena, and (3) using these inferences to coordinate theory and empirical evidence.
