Today, we have more than 30,000 members worldwide and remain committed to combining traditional scientific values with cutting-edge methods and innovative practices. The APS Convention hosts more than 4,200 psychological scientists and students annually and more than 2,200 attendees at its biennial International Convention of Psychological Science. Every day, APS works to share and advocate for our science, to promote the latest research findings, and to cultivate a diverse and engaged community of psychological scientists, many of whom are here in San Francisco.

I look forward to interacting with all of you over the next few days as we enjoy the exceptional program put together by Program Committee Chair **Elizabeth Kensinger** and committee members **Daniel Ansari, Margaret E. Beier, Carsten K.W. de Dreu, Jeffrey Holmes, Lis Nielsen, Elizabeth Page-Gould, Luiz Pessoa, Jennifer L. Tackett, Jessica L. Tracy,** and **Lotte van Dillen**.

A highlight of this year's program is the *Inside the Psychologist's Studio* event with APS Past President Henry L. Roediger, III. An APS William James Fellow and recipient of the APS Mentor Award, Roediger is renowned for his study of human learning and memory, particularly memory retrieval. This conversation promises to be a fascinating exploration of professional and personal experiences mined from his illustrious career.

This year brings many exciting changes at APS. The first issue of APS's newest journal, *Advances in Methods and Practices in Psychological Science (AMPPS)*, debuted in March. Under the leadership of Founding Editor Dan Simons and his editorial team, this one-of-a-kind journal publishes new types of empirical work as well as articles and tutorials that reflect the latest methodological approaches to research across the field. It also serves as the new outlet for large-scale replication efforts, including Registered Replication Reports. *AMPPS* encompasses the full range of psychological science in both perspective and process, spanning the ever-expanding landscape of theoretical frameworks and methodological techniques.

APS continues to develop new ways to share the latest findings in psychological research with the public. Our association now has 56,000 Twitter followers and nearly 200,000 likes on Facebook. In 2017, APS launched the "Psychological Science Update," a weekly news and research brief sent exclusively to current members that is a treasure trove of information on the latest research, our members in the news, training and career resources, and funding and policy updates.

We are looking forward to the third International Convention of Psychological Science, to be held 7–9 March 2019 in Paris,


France. ICPS will be headlined by keynote speakers BJ Casey of Yale University, Frans B.M. de Waal of Emory University, and Atsushi Iriki of the RIKEN Brain Science Institute in Japan. Their work demonstrates the intersection of psychological science with other disciplines to more precisely investigate the deep complexity of our internal and external lives. As we recognize these new initiatives, we also mark the departure of longtime APS Treasurer Roberta L. Klatzky, whose stewardship of the organization's finances has been a critical element in APS's steady growth and impact within our discipline and in the world more generally. Please join me in thanking her for many years of service to APS and the field.

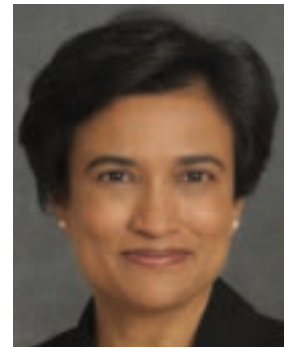
It is with great sadness that I note the passing of two distinguished figures in the field of psychological science, APS Past President John T. Cacioppo and APS Past Secretary Anne Treisman. Cacioppo was a 2018 recipient of the APS William James Fellow Award and a cofounder of the field of social neuroscience. His APS presidential column on psychological science as a hub discipline continues to be among the most influential and widely read articles on the importance of collaboration and multidisciplinary research. Treisman, also an APS William James Fellow, was a preeminent cognitive psychologist whose insights into human visual attention were so foundational to cognitive psychology that it is virtually impossible to overstate their impact. One tangible signifier is the National Medal of Science, which she was awarded by President Barack Obama in 2013. These titans of psychological science will be deeply missed.

APS enters its fourth decade with 75 times more members than it started with, and as our numbers have grown, so has our capacity to serve psychological scientists of every variety. APS members come from almost a hundred countries and even more areas of study, scientific backgrounds, theoretical perspectives, and empirical approaches, but we are united by a passionate striving for truth about how the mind works at every level, from cells to societies. This 30th Annual Convention is an opportunity to reflect on and celebrate how far the organization and the field of psychological science have come over the past three decades while also looking forward to the many new methods, breakthroughs, and paradigm shifts that are sure to come.

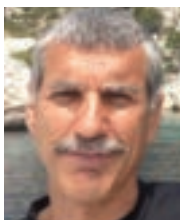

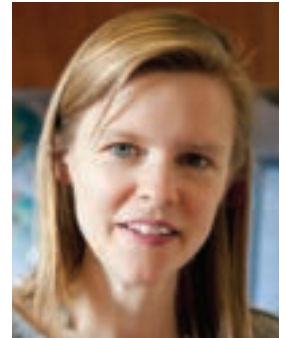

Making and Remaking Memory: Past, Present, and Future

Without memory, there is no past, nor a predictable future, but only an ever-present present. Important as it is, memory remains poorly understood. What are memories, how do we make them, and how are they affected by the passage of time and new experiences? In this presentation, I will briefly discuss some history of thinking about memory and then concentrate on three major issues and their implications. First, is memory a singular thing, or are there many kinds? Second, are memories fixed once they are formed, or are they changeable after the fact? And third, why are the brain systems responsible for memories of life events also central to our ability to form and use cognitive maps of space? The deep connection between space and memory, reflecting much of my work over the years, provides the framework for this talk, which will range widely over matters cognitive, clinical, developmental, and personal.

Making and Remaking Memory: Past, Present, and Future

Lynn Nadel

The University of Arizona

Without memory, there is no past, nor a predictable future, but only an ever-present present. Important as it is, memory remains poorly understood. What are memories, how do we make them, and how are they affected by the passage of time and new experiences? In this presentation, I will briefly discuss some history of thinking about memory and then concentrate on three major issues and their implications. First, is memory a singular thing, or are there many kinds? Second, are memories fixed once they are formed, or are they changeable after the fact? And third, why are the brain systems responsible for memories of life events also central to our ability to form and use cognitive maps of space? The deep connection between space and memory, reflecting much of my work over the years, provides the framework for this talk, which will range widely over matters cognitive, clinical, developmental, and personal.

Technology influences every dimension of modern human experience – how people think, feel, and interact – and its impact promises to increase at an exponential rate in the years ahead. Technology Meets Neuroscience - a Vision of the Future of Brain Optimization

Melina Uncapher, University of California, San Francisco

A fundamental challenge of modern society is the development of effective approaches to enhance brain function and cognition in both the healthy and impaired. For the healthy, this should be a core mission of our educational system and for the cognitively impaired this is the primary goal of our medical system. Unfortunately, neither of these systems have effectively met this challenge. I will describe a novel approach developed in our research center at UCSF - Neuroscape - that uses custom-designed video games to achieve meaningful and sustainable cognitive enhancement via personalized closed-loop systems (Nature 2013; Neuron 4014). I will also share with you the next stage of our research program, which integrates our video games with the latest technological innovations in software (e.g., brain computer interface algorithms, GPU computing, cloud-based analytics) and hardware (e.g., virtual reality, mobile EEG, motion capture, physiological recording devices (watches), transcranial brain stimulation) to further enhance our brain's information processing systems with the ultimate aim of improving quality of life.
