Paradoxically, certain conditions that impair performance during instruction or practice can enhance learning, whereas conditions that retard forgetting and enhance performance during practice often fail to support learning. Parents Without Parenting

GENERAL

About 30 years ago, "parenting" happened. People have always cared about their children, but "parenting" turns caring for children into a plan to create a particular kind of child and adult— smart, successful, or just happy. But this picture of parents and children is profoundly wrong, both scientifically and practically.

Children need care, but they don't need to be shaped in a particular way. There are new ideas about human evolution and how children actually learn from the people who care for them through everyday observation, conversation, and play. The latest science tells us that caring for children means creating a rich, safe, and stable world where they can thrive. But children are messy, unpredictable, imaginative, and very different from their parents and from each other; this lets people innovate, create, and survive in an unpredictable world.

"Parenting" treats childhood as a time of careful control, but it should be complicated, unpredictable, and constantly surprising.
