Breaking Free — Intersecting Perspectives on the Science of Behavior Change 41

People seek to modify their behaviors in a wide range of domains—healthier eating, smoking cessation, increased exercise, reduced electricity and water usage, and avoiding racial and gender discrimination are all common goals of behavior change efforts. These efforts face a common problem: current behaviors are destructive yet automatic, habitual, and/or rewarding, and the self-control resources needed to override them are easily depleted. This theme program highlights cutting-edge research by scientists approaching the problem of behavior change from several perspectives within psychological science.

Advancing Psychological Science Through Technology 49

From smartphones to medical breakthroughs to online education, rapidly advancing technology has revolutionized the way we live. This revolution is raising exciting new questions for both the science and the applications of psychology. Can we treat mental health challenges remotely using the Internet? What are the consequences on development? Can we use neuroimaging technology to adaptively control our own brains? How do we make the most of the ‘wisdom of the crowds’? Can we use technology to study humans as they behave in a more natural setting? Within this cross-cutting theme, leading thinkers will share the latest advances and techniques, discuss the potential of technology for psychology, and offer a window into the future role of technology in our discipline.

The Meaning of Time 64

Time affects our thoughts, feelings, and behaviors at a variety of levels, yet scientists have been slow to study these influences. This cross-cutting theme program includes a diverse set of presentations on time perception. The talks will cover findings on how neural memory structures enable simulation of future events, perceptions of having lots or little time left in life, construing events as “soon” or “a while from now,” individual differences in time perceptions affecting work behavior, and autobiographical life stories. Whatever your schedule, be sure to make time for these presentations.

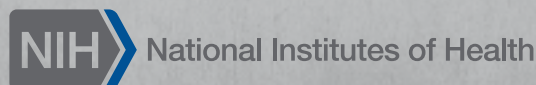

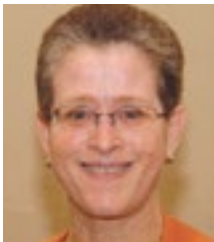

And of course we have a new APS Executive Director, Sarah Brookhart, who took over last fall following the retirement of founding Executive Director Alan Kraut. Congratulations and thanks to everyone for taking on these critical and influential roles in the organization and in the field.

In this digital era, APS continues to develop new ways to engage with the public and share the latest news and most recent findings in psychological science. In addition to the 14 million times APS journal articles were accessed in 2015, the Association now has over 42,000 Twitter followers and nearly 160,000 fans on Facebook, and hundreds of thousands of visitors online each month.

Building on the massive success of the first International Convention of Psychological Science in 2015, We will once again be congregating across the pond to discuss the latest cross-cutting ventures and explorations of the mind. The second biennial ICPS will take place in March 2017 in Vienna, Austria, and will be headlined by three keynote speakers — W. Tecumseh Fitch of the University of Vienna, Linda B. Smith of Indiana University, and Thomas Bourgeron of the Pasteur Institute in Paris, France. Their research exemplifies the crucial insights and connections that can be revealed when psychological science intersects with other disciplines. About 30 years ago, “parenting” happened. People have always cared about their children, but “parenting” turns caring for children into a plan to create a particular kind of child and adult—smart, successful, or just happy. But this picture of parents and children is profoundly wrong, both scientifically and practically.

Children need care, but they don’t need to be shaped in a particular way. There are new ideas about human evolution and how children actually learn from the people who care for them through everyday observation, conversation, and play. The latest science tells us that caring for children means creating a rich, safe, and stable world where they can thrive. But children are messy, unpredictable, imaginative, and very different from their parents and from each other; this lets people innovate, create, and survive in an unpredictable world.

“Parenting” treats childhood as a time of careful control, but it should be complicated, unpredictable, and constantly surprising.

The cognitive map, our mental map of our environment and where we are in it, is a foundation of cognition. Without it, we are truly lost. Moreover, it is Exhibit A in the computational theory of mind, because it is a complex abstract representation computed from diverse experiences in different parts of our environment at different times. Jennifer Richeson's research focuses on the social psychological phenomena of cultural diversity. Her work generally concerns the ways in which social group memberships such as race and gender impact the way people think, feel, and behave. Specifically, she examines the processes of mind and brain that give rise to stereotyping and prejudice and, in turn, shape the ways in which individuals experience diversity.

Richeson was named one of 25 MacArthur Fellows in 2006 for her work as a leader in "highlighting and analyzing major challenges facing all races in America and in the continuing role played by prejudice and stereotyping in our lives." In 2015, she won the John Simon Guggenheim Foundation Fellowship and was also elected to the US National Academy of Sciences. She is a past member of the APS Board of Directors.

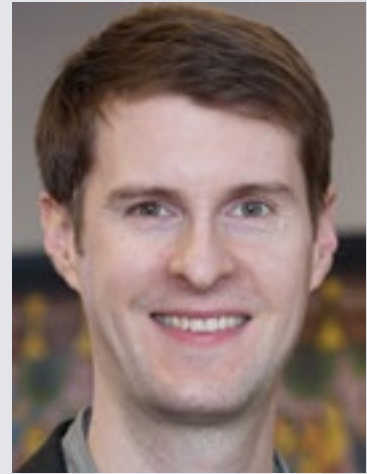

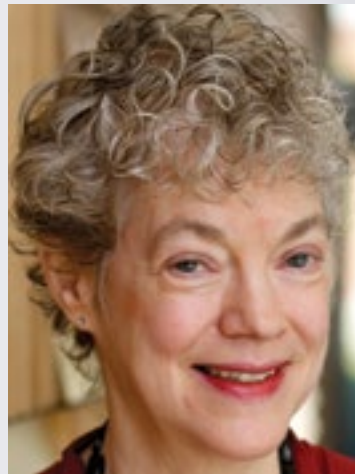
